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SciLifeLab & Journal *Science* Team up on Global Young Scientist Prize

The Science & SciLifeLab Prize for Young Scientists was announced in June this year and is aimed at young scientists at the very start of their careers. The categories for this award are Genomics/Proteomics/Systems Biology, Developmental Biology, Molecular and Cell Biology as well as Environmental Life Science with candidates having to submit a thousand word essay that is judged by an independent editorial team organized by *Science*.

Although this is the first year, interest has been extremely high and the prize has received a high number of entries.

"I am impressed with the amount of interest in this prize and in only a short time period – we now have a very high number of qualified submissions", says Bill Moran, Director of Global Collaboration at Science/AAAS.

Professor Mathias Uhlén, Director for SciLifeLab comments, "Science has never been more exciting and we need to support and encourage young researchers today and tomorrow." Professor Uhlén continues, "We are therefore excited for the truly tremendous response for the announcement of this new award for outstanding achievements by young scientists."

Science for Life Laboratory (SciLifeLab), established in 2010, is based in Stockholm and Uppsala and is a joint effort between four Swedish universities and serves as a national resource for all of Sweden. The infrastructure at SciLifeLab includes state-of-the-art technologies and know-how for high-throughput molecular biosciences and has more than 200 research groups.

Science, the world's leading journal of original scientific research, global news and commentary, is headquartered in Washington DC. The journal was first published in 1880 by Thomas Edison and has a weekly readership of over 130,000. The journal is published by the AAAS, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a non-profit organization dedicated to advancing science and serving society.

The total prize money of US \$35,000 will recognize the brightest and the best new ideas in science. Added to this the grand prize winning essay will be published in the journal *Science* on December 6th and the essays of the runners up will be published online in early December.

A grand prize ceremony will be held December 9th in Stockholm, Sweden with all prize winners being in attendance. Attendees will visit SciLifeLab in both Uppsala and Stockholm. "We very much look forward to welcoming these bright young scientists to the SciLifeLab community." says Kerstin Lindblad-Toh, Co-Director of SciLifeLab.
